Adrian Schachter

Adrian Schachter (b.1996, NYC) is a contemporary visual artist whose works are developed through a sense of idealistic cynicism, moving him to analyze all hypocrisies and inconsistencies encountered. When applied to the world of images, Adrian was bombarded with an online presence since childhood, along with the rest of his generation. There was an appetite for digesting data in every form that was nothing less than voracious. Yet, the more diverse and psychologically charged the information was, the more Adrian became increasingly numbed and detached. While trying to elaborate this through his practice, Adrian found that pairing disparate but somehow tangentially related imagery created unintended relationships more profound and unexpected than when they existed on their own. In the process of mining for content that gets translated into his paintings, Adrian teases out and highlights connections that transform the way the viewer perceives the underlying material, creating new and unforeseen narratives in the process. Adrian lives and works in London, UK.

Alice Macdonald (b.1992), London. Primarily working in painting her practice also includes drawing, printmaking, ceramics and installation. Fascinated by the complexities of human behaviour and emotion, Her work has its foundations in a diaristic practice of drawing people from observation and memory. She is particularly drawn to drawing women – she says - 'Aware that the male gaze has deeply influenced how I and society expect women to look and behave, I paint myself and other women in examination of female experience and friendship, my own relationship to womanhood and my received concept of femininity.' Alice studied at Falmouth University, 2014, and The Royal Drawing School, 2017. She has undertaken residencies including at Rhode Island School

of Design, USA, at The Institute of Fine Arts, India, and at Dumfries House, Scotland. Following in a great line of satirical Black artists, like Kara Walker, David Hammons, Renee Cox and Beverly McIver, who use elements of satire to express an anti-racist viewpoint.

Ariane Hughes

Through processes of objectification, fragmentation and amplification, Ariane's paintings hold a mirror to the age of the spectacle, drawing on the ubiquity and farcicality of the digital image and online viewing space. The female nude is a recurring subject in Hughes' work. She employs the feminine body as a pictorial trope to instigate an ironical commentary on today's culture of voyeurism and the perpetuation of idealised online self-representation. By simultaneously drawing attention to the artifice of the image while presenting it as truth through naturalistic renderings, Hughes is reflecting on the function of social media - the precession of the simulacra. Engaging with the aesthetics and history of surrealism, Hughes' paintings exaggerate the interplay between the real and the unreal. She uses traditional artistic techniques to re-engage her audience in the act of looking, encouraging us to consider online habits and the passive consumption of images in our digital world.

Armaghan Fatemi

As a multidisciplinary Iranian artist, based in London, Armaghan's work focuses on the exploration of socio-political issues, examined specifically from a feminist and autobiographical point of view. Her choice of medium is guided by my concept. Working with varied media, the artist uses art to question the norms she grew up with through the lens of her feminist identity. The social distancing measures and mandatory solitude that ensued from the Covid-19 pandemic in 2020 marked a seismic shift in Armaghan's practice. Previously working as a conceptual artist, she prolifically began painting. It is when she has finished painting, that the most important part begins. At this moment the artist can step back and read the hidden meanings within the imagery. This process of reflective self-psychoanalysis, newly afforded to her thanks to painting, is key to knowing and healing herself.

Hajduk's practice includes drawing, painting, and sculpture. He is influenced by the realm of personal mythologies, memories, fantasies, sexuality, spirituality and cosmology, as well as Polish culture and rural sensibility. His works reflect a desire to re-engage oneself with the natural world and the wider universe around us. Throughout his drawings and paintings, Hajduk creates sensuous and intimate dreamscapes or ecologies populated with animals, animal-human hybrids, plants, planets and biological forms. In this imagined reality, the boundaries between human and non-human perceptions become blurred and merge together. Benjamin Warner (b.1994, Suffolk) has exhibited at Tate Modern, Firstsite and Leeds Art Gallery. He was one of the participating artists for the Zabludowicz Collection's Master Class 2020 and previously cut his teeth working for Jake & Dinos Chapman and British Art Show 8 amongst others. His works draw from Solastalgia, which

describes a form of emotional distress caused by environmental change. It defines a feeling of homesickness to a place of landscape or time rendered unrecognizable by climate change. His practice weaves art-historical connections between different media and vastly different eras of artistic practice - always returning to the sculptural question of how material matters. A thread running through all of the work is an attempt to conjure qualities of reverie, solace and contemplation – often presenting the body as a vessel; not only through birth, life and death but as a vessel of possibility.

Her works therefore invoke the practice of world-building as a means of exploring cultural theory and the evolution of selfhood through the lens of fantasy. Agusto earned her BA in Fine Art in 2020 from Central Saint Martins, London and is currently pursuing an MA in the History of Art & Archaeology at SOAS University. She has exhibited work internationally, including at Palais de Tokyo, Paris; Saatchi Gallery, London; Petrie Museum of Egyptian Archaeology, London; and Alliance Française, Lagos.

Ceidra Moon Murphy (b.1998) is a multidisciplinary artist living and working in London. Murphy's work investigates the presence of lost information in spaces and objects. Predominantly using photography, a medium which has an established but fraught relationship to memory and truth, Murphy seeks to treat her subjects as vessels which contain ghosts of intelligence. The works highlight the fragile correlation between preservation and deterioration: their apparent opposition in contrast with their mutual reliance and interchangeability. The pieces aim to mimic their subjects, in their futile attempt to preserve 'it' and its already lost contents. Murphy is also a photography theorist; her next essay will be published in Photographies journal.

complications, trauma, and identity. Clare Stent is concerned with the perception of place and becoming; exploring liminal space and our means of experiencing it through her art practice. She creates documentation and archives using drawing, photography, mapping and painting. These can take the form of literal archives where she has studied a particular place, looking at many aspects from differing viewpoints. Repetitively drawing and walking so the place is familiar and experienced in her body, 'like the back of my hand'. Sometimes she uses contour maps, redrawing to make manifest what lies beneath the land, an experiential and performative act to bring the subliminal landscape to the surface. Gardening has always been important to her and forms part of her practice. She has often used plants she has grown in her work, for example making natural dyes and inks. In 'Land I Till' she has documented personal growing projects on her allotment and garden. Her experience beyond her art practice has been concerned with communities in healing, education and arts contexts. Her understanding is that our individual experience cannot be separated from the communal experience in which it is set, this includes the ecological context.

Working with jewellery serves her as a platform for playing and dabbling in different fields such as digital art, installation and sculpture. She is part of LIOS labs and The Palace Collective. In her work she mainly deals with the topics of identity, rootedness and the human animals views on their own positioning in the bigger picture, challenging different spiritual theories of and creating her own. Maryam Fahim (b. 1989, India) studied at the Royal College of Art, London (2019) and the HAW, Hamburg, Germany (2016).

Hellena embraces jewellery as a symbolic messenger that reflects cultural experience as for example rites of

passage of subcultures. She uses traditional jewellery techniques alongside a variety of digital methods. In the matter of material - precious gemstones and metal fusing with battled jeans and found red wine cork. Her methodology sometimes sends her out for fearless field trips to catch a certain aesthetic or to chase spirits. Hellena Hueck (b. 1985, Germany) studied at the Royal College of Art, London (2020) and the School of Applied Art, Pforzheim, Germany (2017). She is also a trained goldsmith.

In late summer 2020 Hellena and Maryam met at a pub on Coldharbour Lane. Their exchange of picturesque ideas and narratives around cabbage mysticism, double yolked eggs, smoking earth tunnels and a practice, based on limited resources led to a collaborative accessory project with the title 'Layan Hell'. Layan Hell is flirting with nature, has muddy hands and its talismans possess a sense of liveliness.

Hui-Chin Cho

The intersections, enigmas, and inevitable conflicts of multiculturalism are central in Cho's practice. Her Taiwanese background and ancestral lineages to Japan, China, and the Netherlands, provide a starting point for the imaginary space of her work. The artist is interested in the aesthetics of Japanese anime and the iconography of infants to question the politics and ethics of figuration and material choices. Human desire, fetish, ambivalence, sadism and obsession find their way into her work, and Cho approaches each piece in a multidisciplinary way, through painting, sculpture, drawing, installation, text, animation, and photographic processes. Through an experimental approach, she observes and gathers layers of symbolism and meanings through metaphorical interpretations of diverse materials such as antique leathers or abandoned objects. Each composition is an exploration of the philosophical and metaphysical in-between of the human relationship to time, space, life and death. Cho seeks to establish an inner equilibrium between rational analysis and sentimental interpretations. She assumes that all figures, colours, and materials can be analysed, deconstructed, criticised, in all their manifestations, finally crystallising to reveal hidden metaphors and perspectives.

Recent shows include, Urban Record: Hybrid Artists (Keumsan Gallery, Seoul, 2021); 20th Korean International Art Fair (COEX, Seoul, 2021). Jess Beige's practice extends between elements of performance, sculpture, installation, painting, music and drawing. Her most recent works from the series called, The Odyssey for T O G E T H E R(2019~), use a variety of primarily found, natural materials, such as faux fur, metal, wood, fabric, plastic, thread, beads, etc - and when assembled together, create a hybrid of architectural, anatomical yet fractured forms, utilising languages descending from the East and West as a way to map issues on diversity and togetherness. While the series of works are sculptural and materialistic, she

As a mallrat, her visual language was formed strictly from the saturation of advertisements and Hong Kong popular and "Mo lei tau" (a nonsensical humour unique to Hong Kong) culture. Growing up watching tourists merge with mainlanders and fellow locals, she developed her eye for street casting – before committing to photography she worked heavily in casting for projects like DIS magazine and the first 5 seasons of Wales Bonner.

Kerrie Addy (b. 1994, Huddersfield, UK) graduated from the Slade School of Fine Art with a BFA in 2017. Addy's multidisciplinary practice works to develop enigmatic narratives rooted in her writing and sees coherent figuration blurring into dreamlike symbolism. Capturing moments of slippage within fictitious worlds that are almost parallel to reality, the artist's image-making distorts our understanding of the 'domestic' by introducing suggestions of the otherworldly. Each scene appears familiar yet strange and reveals the domestic interior as a place of uncertainty, haunted by past trauma and not defined by linear trajectories.

Kim Chin uses her familiarity with mixed materiality for self-examination, part of which re- sulted in small paintings that reflected the head space and environment she occupied during lockdown. Themes revolve around the human body as vessels for interpretation, tension, and connection - pulling from Chin's multi-ethnic upbringing and extensive time spent working internationally. Sub-themes of recollection and suppression, womanhood, endurance, dual- ities, transitions, time, self-acceptance, and our responsibility as global citizens in a planet that has finite resources, are expressed through mask-like characters and ambiguous spaces that could represent both the physical and non-physical world. Music, memory, and Google searches, allows Chin to re-educate herself in a spiritual, but humorous way. Chin graduated from the University of Arts, London (Chelsea) with a BA Hons in Textile Design. Chin continues to expand her knowledge in sustainable and ethical systems, with a vision of creativity that is speculative, renewing, and hopeful.

Laila Tara H (b.1995, London) is an Iranian-British artist whose work stems from Indo-Persian miniature painting.

Symbolic forms and multiple, concurrent narratives punctuate the space. Laila's practice is infused with a visual language borrowed from Indo-Persian miniature painting. A complex history of migration and an amalgam of painting traditions, gave birth to these hybrid styles in the 17th century, which saw painters traveling from Persia to the Mughal Court and the Deccan in India, through established shipping or overland routes. Laila's Iranian heritage, and years spent moving through continents not only exposed her to these forms, but have also inspired the language through which she articulates her own history of living in different cultural settings. Laila uses pigments that are naturally derived and prepared using traditional techniques. She often cuts and folds paper, puncturing and destabilising space to introduce new three-dimensional depth and shadow play. Her works explore a range of emotions, and create a charged surface where the tension between form and formlessness; the object and its surrounding emptiness, plays out. The figures explore our sense of perspective and time, and are interlaced with deeply personal narratives.

She is especially interested in the visuality of assimilation, and explores this through print and image. She seeks to challenge the notion of a fixed truth that 'seeing is knowing,' that perception of a body in culture equals the real. Analysis of Zisman's multiple identities (especially her Venezuelan Jewish-ness and her manufactured digital persona) outlets is consistently woven into her work. Primary research imagery is often sourced by mixing together and styling clothing meant for specific identities (such as traditional Ashkenazi garments with Instagram it-girl clothing) to completely obscure their original purposes.
