London, UK: This summer, <u>PEER</u> presents the first institutional solo exhibition by Hackney-based multi-disciplinary artist **Moi Tran** (b. Vietnam, 1977). *Civic Sound Archive*, comprises video, sound and tapestry with a recording booth, library, and website. It is an unruly anecdotal repository for sonic expression as personal testimony and celebrates the joy of poor acoustics and fleeting sonic encounters that are often devalued within traditional archival methods. *Civic Sound Archive* runs from 1 July until 3 September and admission is free.

Over the past two years Tran has invited individuals - predominately from East and Southeast Asian communities - to contribute audio and visual recordings of songs, prayers, stories, and poems recited in various languages and dialects. The result is a growing, open-source collection of sonic and visual material; the project acts as an ongoing process of knowledge-making that uses a form of sonic autoethnography to map personal experiences.

Tran says: 'Civic Sound Archive aims to create safe agency for the contribution of diverse forms of sonic expression as personal testimony. My intention is to question and disrupt the conventional system of archiving, dismantling the space that demands a static narrative, and creating a non-static space of ever shifting histories.'

Continually inviting new voices into the project, Tran has produced a purpose-built recording studio to encourage live contributions from visitors to PEER throughout the exhibition. She calls this process of gathering and recording contributions from individuals 'sonic witnessing'. Her presentation of *Civic Sound Archive* at PEER acts as a laboratory, where visitors can consider how language and song have the potential to be political, malleable, and sculptural.

Moi Tran was born in Vietnam in 1977 and now lives and works in Hackney, London. Her practice explores the intersection between contemporary art and live performance through theatre, text, sound, installation, and video.
